# Victorian Horticultural Show



In June 2024 Dunoon Burgh Hall celebrated its 150th Anniversary with a creative research project inspired by the annual show of 'Dunoon and District Horticultural Society'. On 21 September 2024 we created a contemporary re-interpretation to coincide with Doors Open Day.

We showcased an impressive array of produce, baked goods, and arts and crafts created by our community inlouding baking, preserves, fruit, vegetables, flower displays, pot plants and ferns, and botanical artwork.

We ran art workshops with Primary 6/5 pupils from Kirn Primary School in the days preceding the show. Working with artist Jill Bryson pupils learned to sew with scrap fabric and buttons to create their own headwear inspired by fruit and vegetables. These were on display at the Horticultural Show.

Dunoon Players performed their new play, 'The Horticultural Society Show'. This play was written specifically for the event and was inspired by the heritage. It was performed 3 times during the afternoon to visitors to the Horticultural Show.



J: I followed all the news about the American civil war. You Mr Work was on the right side, wanting to abolish slavery.

# Children and young people



### Horticultural Shows at Dunoon Burgh Hall


### **Dates Unknown**

These photographs capture the vibrant displays of fruit, flowers, and vegetables beautifully arranged on the stage and beneath the balcony at Dunoon Burgh Hall. While we don't yet know the exact year these flower shows took place, they may date from one of the known horticultural exhibitions held in the Hall in 1925, 1927, 1947, 1977, or 1979.

### The Caretaker's Flat at Dunoon Burgh Hall

The caretaker's flat was located at the back of the Burgh Hall, where the office and workshop space now stand. Access was from outside the building, just beyond what is now the café extension. The modest flat consisted of two rooms, a kitchen, and a bathroom.

The caretaker's responsibilities were demanding—keeping eight public rooms heated and lit, ensuring everything was in proper order, and tending the garden. The building was powered by coal boilers, housed in this very space, which made it reputedly the warmest place in the entire Hall.

During renovation works between 2014 and 2017, an intriguing discovery was made behind the fireplace and mantelpiece—a collection of old photos and slides. Among them was a glass plate slide and several portraits printed on cardboard.

To this day, the identities of the people in these photographs remain a mystery. Could you help us uncover their stories?

### Nan McCallum. Caretaker of Dunoon Burgh Hall (1951–1976)

One of the longestserving residents of the caretaker's flat was Nan McCallum, who, along with her husband Archie McCallum, lived at Dunoon Burgh Hall for 25 years. Archie worked as a burgh driver, while Nan took great pride in her role as caretaker from 1951 to 1976.

Nan had a deep love for the small garden beside the Hall, filling it with vibrant flowers every summer. Office staff often commented on how lovely it looked when they passed through. She was known for her meticulous care in keeping the building clean, warm, and welcoming.



Her daughter, Jean Buckles, shares this memory:
"I remember my dad stoking the coal boiler every morning, sometimes coming home at lunchtime to fill it up. I used to play in the boiler house—it was a very cosy, warm little home.

There were two bedrooms, a bathroom, and a kitchen/living room. A separate kitchen was promised but didn't happen until around 1969 or 1970."

### Bob of the Burgh Hall Caretaker of Dunoon Burgh Hall (1914–1948)



Robert Wilson, affectionately known as "Bob of the Burgh Hall," was the caretaker of Dunoon Burgh Hall for many years, serving until 1948. He lived in the Hall, likely in the caretaker's flat, with his wife Jane (Jean) McBeath and their family.

Born on 28 July 1872 in Dunoon, Robert played an active role in the community. In 1914, when he signed his father's death certificate, he listed his address as "Burgh Building, Dunoon," confirming his long-standing connection to the Hall.

Robert came from a musical family—his father, also named Robert Wilson, was known as "Robert Wilson Bandmaster", as he was the first conductor of the Dunoon Silver Band/Dunoon Town Band.

Robert passed away on 29 August 1952 at Edward Street, Dunoon, and was laid to rest in Dunoon Old Cemetery, where his headstone bears the names Robert & Jeannie.

He married Jane McBeath (Jean) on 3 September 1904 at the Bath Hotel in Glasgow, beginning a life that would be closely tied to the Burgh Hall and its history.

The Cowal Horticultural Society's Annual Show, dating back to 1892, was held across various Cowal venues, including The Queen's Hall, The Pavilion, and Dunoon Burgh Hall. The Society also organised Spring Shows, often at St Mun's Church Hall, featuring Spring bulbs. Membership was required to enter exhibits, though many joined just to receive the schedule. Notable winners included Dr David Walker and Alistair Brown - dahlias, Jack Gibson - roses, Donald Mackintosh - sweet peas, George Sturrock - grapes, Angus Whyte - onions, Angus Murchison for Dahlias and Gladioli, Donald Murchison - sweet peas.

In March 1902, the Secretary of the Dunoon Horticultural Society issued a letter announcing the intention to reinstate the Annual Flower Show, as it had been nine years since the last one. The article referenced here, recording the flower show in the Burgh Hall from 1892, would have documented one of the final shows before this hiatus. Robert Wilson said 'Dunoon as it is now is – the Queen of Watering places on the Clyde – ought to have its Annual Flower Show'.

By 1923, records mention the Dunoon and Cowal Horticultural Society. In 1940, the first show incorporating the Dunoon and District Gardens and Allotments Association took place. The Society used to run a category for best kept garden, which was supported by the council. The Cowal Horticultural Society continued for many years before formally winding up in 2007. At this point the majority of the vases were donated to the Scottish Rhododendron Society. They have an annual show in Gairlochhead in the Spring.

Sandy Smith was Vice President of the Society from 1981 until 1986; President from 1986 until 1992; and treasurer from 1992 - 2005. He worked alongside Marion Carmichael who was the Minutes Secretary and Leonard Hinge was the honorary president.

Marion was a member of the Horticultural Society for about 50 years and came from a gardening family, with her father-in-law also a gardener. She recalls the effort of preparing the Burgh Hall for shows, which required a two-day hire for setup. She remembers Spring bulb shows being held in the hangar after the Pavilion burned down and before the Queens Hall was built. She also recalls a neighbour telling her about Horticultural Society members inspecting her father's garden to verify his competition entries.

Plant biosecurity is a major concern today, requiring plants to have a passport when transported. It involves measures to prevent the spread of pests, pathogens, and invasive species through trade and natural pathways while managing existing threats. Even plants moved from the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh to Benmore Botanic Garden need passports and must undergo quarantine before planting.

DUNOON, 20th March, 1902.

### Dunoon Borticultural Society.

DEAR SIR,

It is now nine years since the above Society held its last Annual Show, and, at a Meeting held lately, the Members resolved to hold a Show this year.

Dunoon as it now is—the Queen of Watering Places on the Clyde—ought to have its Annual Flower Show, and its resources are equal to those of any of the neighbouring watering-places. Twenty or more years ago, Dunoon stood at the top as having the best Shows in the West of Scotland. This was the opinion of many of the gentlemen who then acted as judges.

Taking these things into consideration, the Committee have resolved, as above stated, to commence anew. They therefore appeal to the Public to give them a helping hand.

# **Angus Murchison**

Angus Murchison was a founding member and honorary president of the Cowal Horticultural Society. He earned top awards at shows in Dunoon, as well as events in Ayr and Renfrew. Renowned for his cultivation of gladioli and sweet peas, he took immense pride in his flowers.


According to his granddaughter Moira, Angus created his own special formula to nourish his blooms, ensuring they lasted longer. She fondly recalls that, as a child, she was not allowed in the big bedroom during flower shows because of the carefully arranged displays. Angus's passion for growing extended to his own back garden, where he built four greenhouses using reclaimed window frames. He was also known to make special trips to Loch Eck to collect fresh water gravel for his garden.





### Peter Gordon Superintendent of Parks



Dunoon Castle Gardens &c. Foreman Gardener &c.

I duly received your letter of the 27th inst., intimating that your wife was prepared to undertake the duties which would devolve upon her in connection with the Cleaning &c. of the various rooms in the Castle, in the event of your being appointed to the position of foreign features &c.

At a meeting of my Council held last night, you were appointed to the position of Foreman Gardener &c., your duties to consist during the Season, of the supervision and keeping in order of the Castle Gardens and the various Parks and open spaces within the Burgh, including the tennis Courts and putting greens and removally to act under and earry out the instructions of the veyor. The wages to be £2 per week, with free house, coal

The duties devolving upon your wife will be to clean and keep in order the Council Chambers, and other rooms within the Castle House, attend to the Library and Reading Room and Billiard Room, and generally as Camptaker. The wage payable in respect to the constant of these duties being 18 or week. The orgagements to be

As montioned in my letter of the 20th inst., and also at your meeting with the Council on the 25th inst., there may be some difficulty in obtaining possession of the house in the Castle occupied by the present gardener and his wife, as they have difficulty in obtaining another house, for which they are

He has also had the supervision and control of the Municipal Bowling Greens, Tennis Courts and Golf Course, as well as the various other open spaces and public gardens throughout the Burgh.

He exercises a kind but firm control over the employees serving under him and obtains the best results in consequence. They recognise him as one who knows his business thoroughly in all its aspects and is therefore worthy of their respect. The maximum number of employees under his control is twelve men and six girls.



### Secular Concert

### 15 April, 1879 Secular Concert in the Burgh Hall

Presented by members of the Dunoon Musical Association
This historic poster was discovered in the Burgh Hall during
renovation works between 2014 and 2017. The concert it
advertises took place just five years after the Burgh Hall first
opened—a significant event, as the Hall was originally built to
provide the town with a much-needed non-religious gathering
space.

Take a closer look at the poster, and you'll notice its well-worn folds, as well as handwritten notes and a drawing on the back.

Though some of the text is faded and difficult to read, it appears to be a conversation between two people. Was this note passed between friends during the concert? A quiet exchange amidst the music?

We can make out parts of the message—what do you think is happening here?

Here is what we can make out:

'.......I did not intend to speak frank to you'

'let the dead past – bury its dead'

'No I won't let the dead bury their dead'

'Why didn't you come to the church on Sunday'

'I had to make the dinner in the morning and I had to eat it in the afternoon'

'Why did you not come to the foot of John Street entrance?'

### Secular Concert cont...

One of our keen volunteers was intrigued by the phrase "Let the dead past bury its dead", which appears in connection with the Secular Concert. His curiosity led him to discover its origin in Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem A Psalm of Life, written in 1838 following the death of the poet's first wife. The line is part of a broader message encouraging us not to dwell on the past or worry about the future.

"Trust no Future, howe'er pleasant!

Let the dead Past bury its dead!

Act,—act in the living Present!


Heart within, and God o'erhead!"

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was one of the most widely known and best-loved American poets of the 19th century. He achieved a level of national and international prominence previously unequaled in the literary history of the United States and is one of the few American writers honored in the Poets' Corner of Westminster Abbey—in fact, he is believed to be the first as his bust was installed there in 1884.

Its origins lie with the 16th Century George Hotel at Piercebridge, Yorkshire." It was originally performed as part of the Secular Concert in 1879, 5 years after the Burgh Hall opened.

Many people knew this song from Children's Favourites on BBC Radio every Saturday morning. It was very famous.

Its origins lie with the George Hotel Yorkshire. It was originally known as The Bridge Inn. Parts of the building date to 17th Century and it was known as a coaching inn. Legendary Dick Turpin is said to have stayed there.

Because coaches needed to leave on time, one of The George's most important possessions was an accurate timepiece. There is a sundial on the outside of the hotel, and in its lobby is a longcase clock made by James Thompson who died in 1825. It was noted for Its good timekeeping.

In mid-Victorian times, The George was run by the Jenkins brothers. The clock may have come into the family's possession on the day the elder brother was born. Immediately after he died, it was noted how the longcase clock lost its accuracy. The second brother continued winding the clock at precisely 11.05 am each day, and on the day he died, the clock stopped, never to go again.

In 1874, Henry Clay Work, a popular American songwriter from Connecticut, heard the story and wrote a version of it from the clock owner's grandson's perspective into a song which he released in 1876. It began:

My grandfather's clock was too large for the shelf; So it stood ninety years on the floor.... But it stopped short – never to go again When the old man died

To this day longcase clocks are known as grandfather clocks.

# John Groom's Crippleage

John Alfred Groom was a London engraver and evangelical preacher, who became concerned with the plight of the poverty-stricken and often disabled girls and women who sold flowers and watercress in the streets around Farringdon Market. His work with them began when he founded the Watercress and Flower Girls' Christian Mission in 1866. A permanent home for the mission was found in Harp Alley and Lord Shaftesbury became its first president. Religious services were held at Foresters' Hall until its destruction in 1890, after which John Groom purchased Woodbridge Chapel, Clerkenwell.

Taking inspiration from the trend for imported handmade flowers, John Groom set up a factory in Sekforde Street, close to the Woodbridge Chapel, where disabled girls could work at making artificial flowers and thus make a living for themselves. The girls lived in houses in Sekforde Street, rented by John Groom. Further factories were subsequently built in Woodbridge Street and Haywards Place. The name of the charity was changed to John Groom's Crippleage and Flower Girls Mission in 1907.

Rising inner London rents forced the charity's council to purchase a large estate in Edgware in 1931 and the whole operation moved there in 1932. In 1965 Edgware opened its doors to male residents.

The charity's name changed again in 1969 to John Groom's Association for the Disabled and in 1990 to John Groom's Association for Disabled People.

John Groom was also very concerned for the welfare of deprived and orphaned children. He bought a house at Clacton-on-Sea and built others around it and his orphanage opened in 1890. During World War II the older children from Clacton were evacuated to Davenport House, Shropshire, with the babies being sent first to Edgware and then to Farncote House, Wolverhampton. After the war the older children moved into a new home at Pilgrim's House, Kent, and the babies moved to the new Cudham Hall, also in Kent. In 1956 Charnwood, near Chislehurst was purchased to provide a family children's home with room for 12 children. Thorpe Bay Children's Home was added to the list in 1951 when John Grooms took over a children's convalescent home at Stamford Hill House. The charity's work with children finally ended in 1979.




